## Part 1

The stock price of Scotland, Inc. has skyrocketed during his reign. He is loved by employees and Wall Street alike, for being dedicated, fair and honest. His office is decorated simply, reflecting his selfless dedication to the company. He is being briefed by a young manager. With him is the Chief Operating Officer, Malcolm. Malcolm is like a son to Duncan. Duncan hired him, and whenever he was promoted, he brought Malcolm with him. The two are very good friends, and Duncan relies on Malcolm to handle the most delicate matters in the company.

The manager is briefing the two of them on a failed hostile takeover that a rival company attempted. When Macbeth wavers, Lady Macbeth tells him to just let her handle all of the details.

As the two converse in the office, a limousine pulls up in front of the hotel. A young bellhop greets Duncan and his entourage as they get out of the car. Lady Macbeth comes through the door and beckons the party inside. She greets Duncan, who thanks her for her hospitality. She then tells him of his importance to both her and Macbeth.

"Duncan! He's dead!" he shouts as the both Macbeth and Lennox, a lower executive who had accompanied him race into the room. There, spread before them, was a dreadful sight: Duncan's body, splayed out in anguish with two bullet holes in his chest. The sheets beneath him were soaked with blood, and the floor underneath revealed a pool of blood beginning to congeal.

As they stand in shock, outside the room where the murder was committed, Malcolm walks in, talking with Donalbain, the Chief Financial Officer. The two of them stare at the group of pale people outside their leader's room, and are shocked. ### Part 3

Part 4
